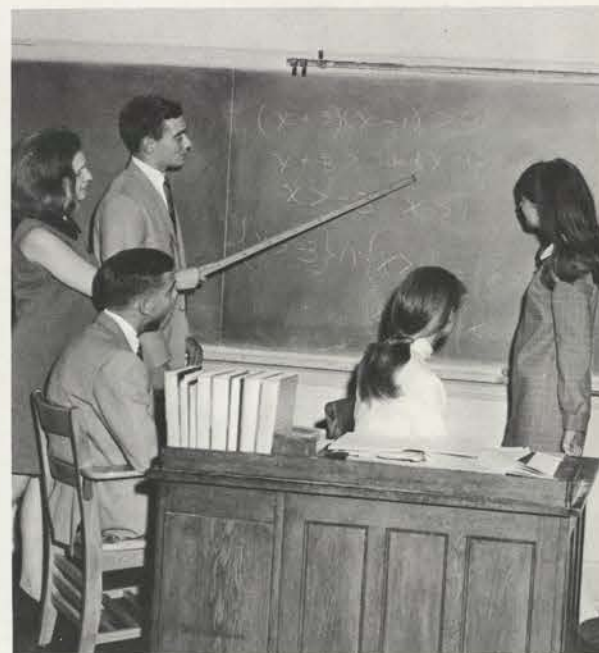

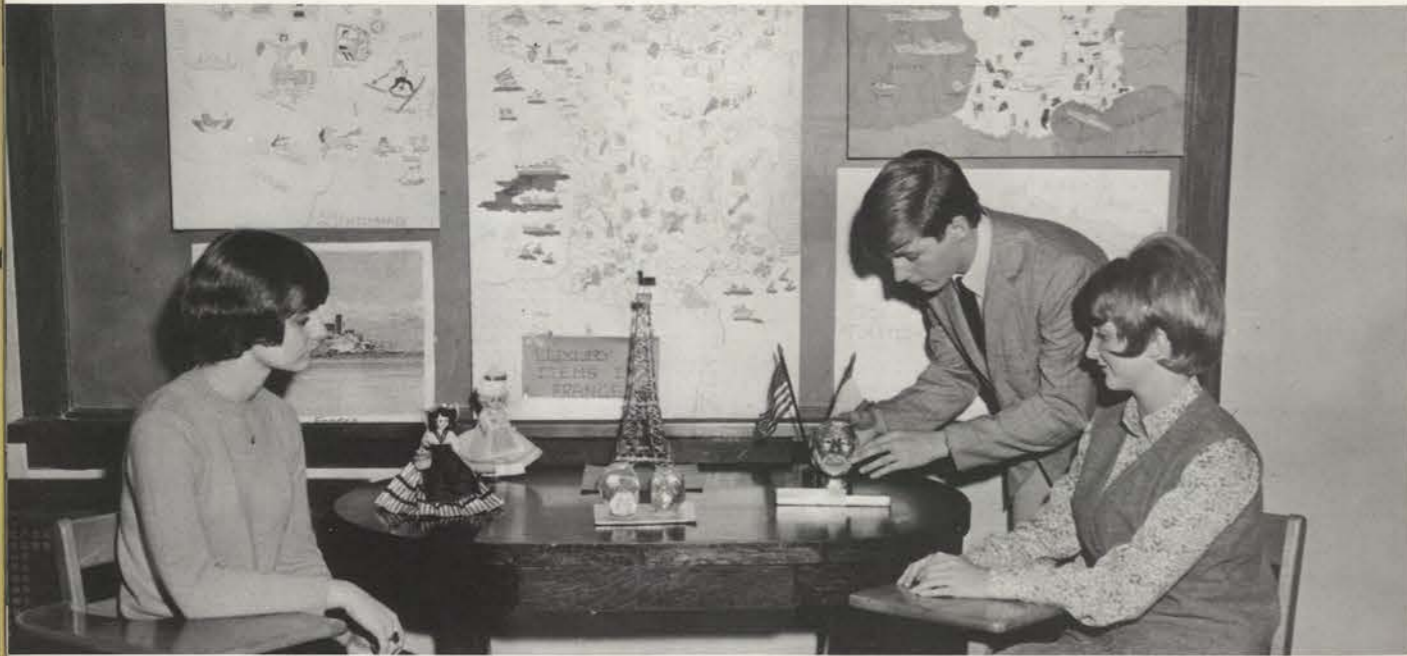

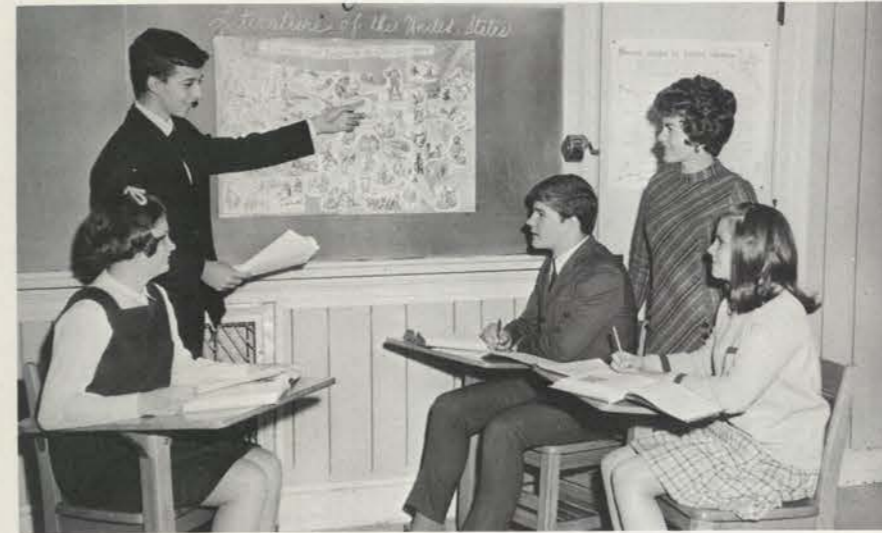

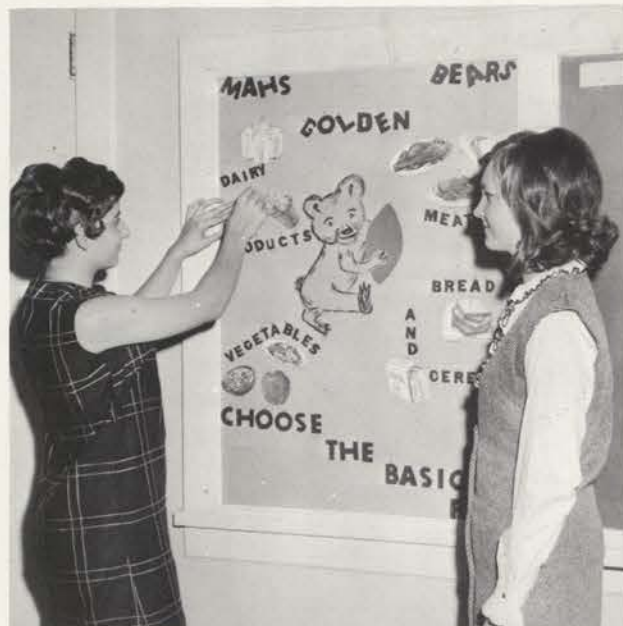

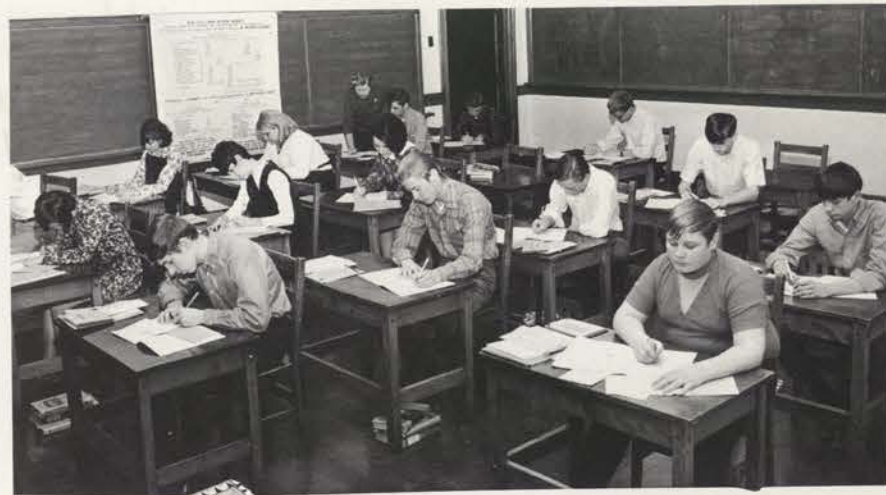

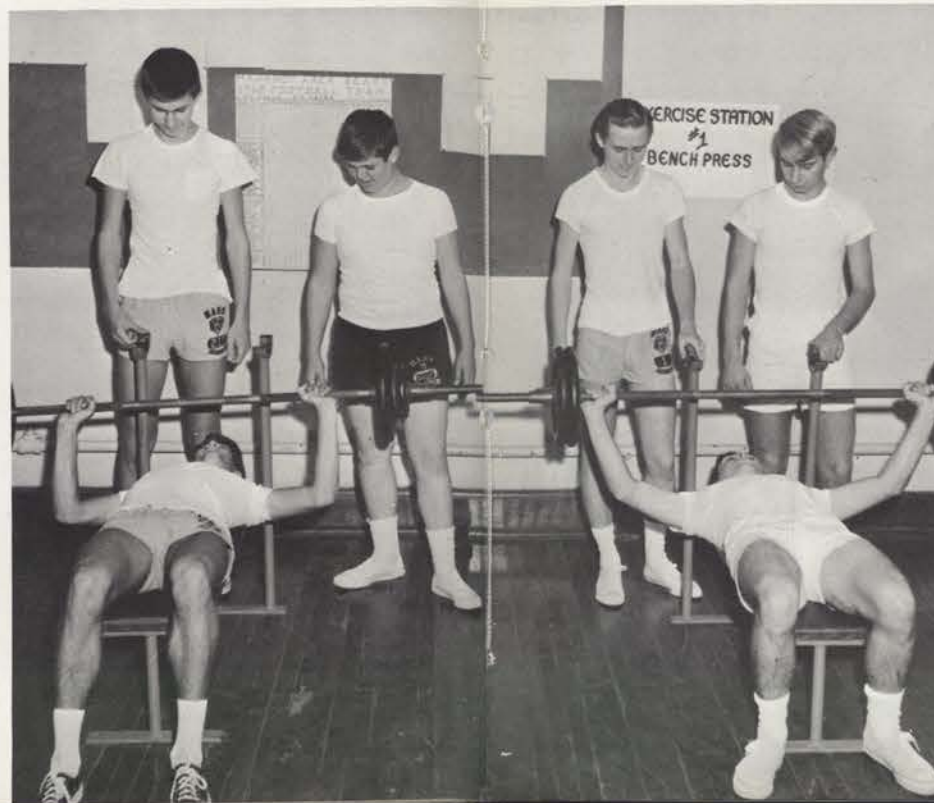

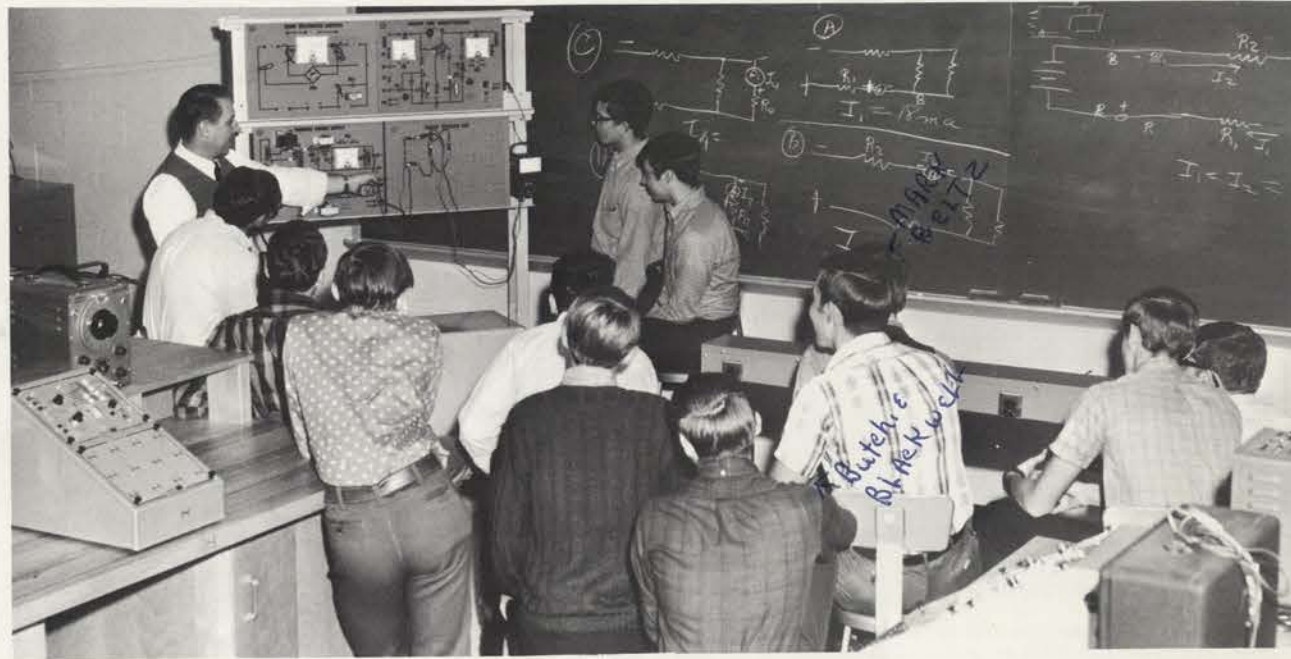

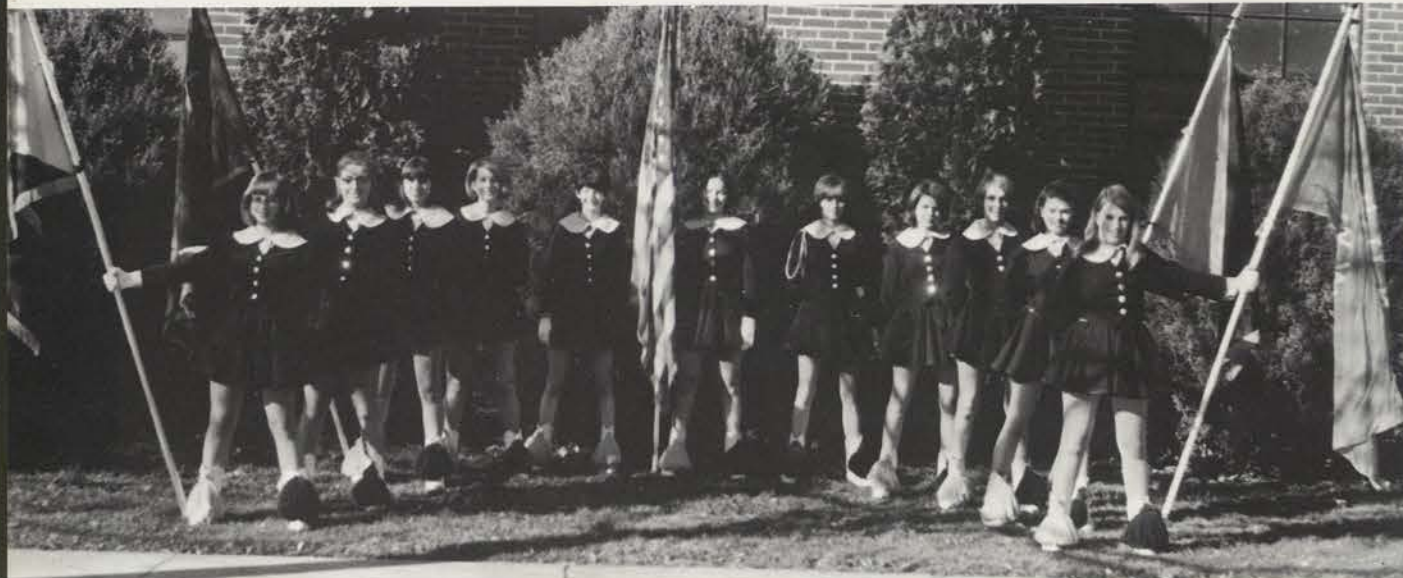

With little varsity experience, the Golden Bears, dominated by underclassmen, opened their 1968 campaign with a loss to St. Clair, 13-6, at the winner's field, September 7. Mahanoy's touchdown was scored on a 27-yard carry by Don Fallon. Winning their first home game over a stunned Pottsville squad Friday, September 13, the Bears' attack began right from the opening kickoff as Sheehan tossed long scoring strikes to Fallon and John Klitsch. Pottsville managed to put a 6-pointer on the board as the half-time totals were posted at 12-6. In an exciting second half, Tempest and McElhenny each scored 6-points to set the final score at 25-6.

Traveling to Mt. Carmel to take on the favored Tornadoes, September 20, Mahanoy Area finished at the short end of a 20-0 score. On their home ground with Minersville, the Bears rolled over the

Minersville eleven. The power of Joe Drahuschak and Jack McElhenny proved too much for the Miners as the Bears won, 25-6. Meeting Tamaqua's Blue Raiders next, they battled to a 6-6 deadlock in action at the John F. Kennedy Stadium, October 4. Mahanoy's touchdown was scored by John Klitsch. October 12, Mahanoy Area lost a hard-fought 20-2 decision to the North Schuylkill Spartans in action at Ashland. Mahanoy's only score came by way of a safety, scored when Leo Whitecavage tackled Rosella of North Schuylkill behind the Spartan's own goal line.

On the road again, this time to Shamokin, the Bears were outclassed, 27-6, with Bob Sheehan picking up the only Mahanoy touchdown on a 6-yard run. Panther Valley invaded Mahanoy Area and was defeated, 7-0, in a hard-fought friendly grudge match, October 25. Time after time the

determined Bear defense stopped the Panthers and forced punting situations. The only score came on an 18-yard touchdown pass from Sheehan to Gary Petritsch. The Area rolled over Schuylkill Haven by a 30-7 edge at the winner's field, November 1. Again the Bears were in command with Drahuschak, McElhenny, and Sheehan tallying Mahanoy's touchdowns.

The final home game of the season found the Bears and Shenandoah fighting to a 7-7 deadlock in a game which featured the forward pass. The contest remained a 0-0 tie until midway through the fourth period when Zukas of Shenandoah finally gave the Devils a 7-0 lead. Mahanoy's Bob Sheehan came through with a 29-yard run to once again knot the score. The Golden Bears ended with a 4 wins, 4 losses, 2 ties tally.

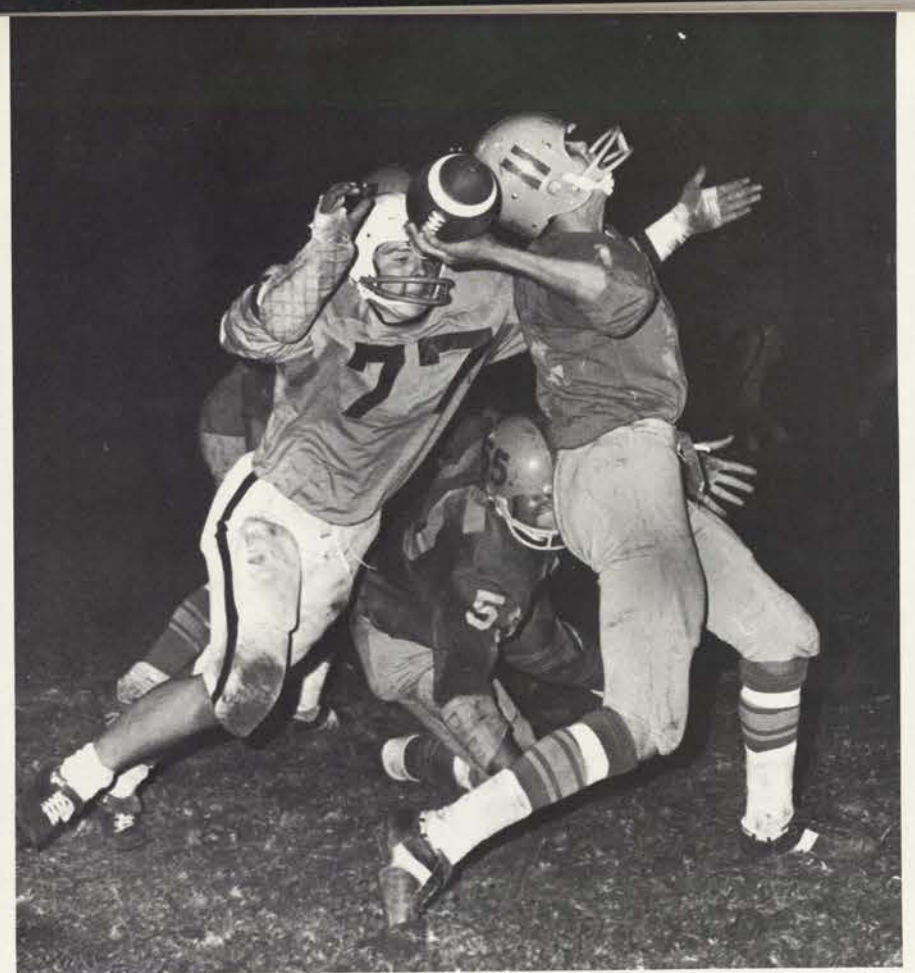


Above: Joseph Balsis, Minersville quarterback, is about to be tackled by Thomas Oblas (67) and Harold Tempest (86).

Bears End Season With 18-6 Record

Mahanoy Area's Golden Bears, coached by Dave Linkchorst, winners of seven North Schuylkill League titles, started the season with high hopes of capturing the title for the eighth time. To open the first half in league play, the Bears trounced Pine Grove, 74-58, with Galetz leading the way with 23 points. The Bears' second league game was another rout, 71-45, with Holland collecting 18 points. Led by Davey Holland with 25 points, the Bears had an easy 88-74 victory over Minersville. Up against a tough North Schuylkill five, the Bears, led by Miller and Galetz with 17 points apiece, won 64-55 decision. The big game of the first half proved to be an overtime victory for Mahanoy as they defeated Panther Valley, 70-58. Against a weak Blue Mountain squad, the Bears won, 77-49, as Joe Whitaker piled up 17 points.

Saint Clair proved to be a tough foe, but the Bears fought for a 54-50 victory. The Area five picked up a well-deserved victory at Shenandoah, 67-63, with Bob Galetz hitting for 15. Paced by Russ Miller's 27 points, the local quintet clinched the first half title with an 80-45 win over Schuylkill Haven.

The Bears started the second half with an easy 87-46 win over Pine Grove. The Red Tornadoes of Mount Carmel were the eleventh league victory in a row with a final 86-58 score. Russ Miller and Rodney Shaker with 16 points each led the Bears to an 83-60 win over Minersville. North Schuylkill

went down to defeat, 54-41, as Galetz collected half the score with 27 points. Panther Valley, out for revenge, gave the Area their first loss in league play, 54-42. After this defeat, the Bears bounded back with a 99-60 win over Blue Mountain. The trip to Saint Clair proved fatal as a hot-shooting Saint Clair team downed the Bears, 70-60. Paced by Russ Miller, Dave Holland, and Bob Galetz, the Bears beat Shenandoah, 74-65. In the last league game Dave Holland dumped in 33 points to give the Bears a 65-53 decision at Schuylkill Haven.

Mahanoy Area, first half champs, and Panther Valley, second half champs, met in St. Joseph's gymnasium in Hazleton on February 27, for the North Schuylkill League Championship. Although Mahanoy Area was the favorite, the Panthers, shooting a sizzling 60 percent from the field, turned the tables and Mahanoy was defeated, 72-48.

Moving into the P.I.A.A. playoffs, the Bears came close to upsetting a much taller Allentown Allen quintet. Coming back strongly in the fourth quarter, the Bears came to within six points of tying up the game as the buzzer sounded. Mahanoy Area could feel proud after a near upset, 71-65, but their season was over. They had won two of four exhibition games, beating Marian Catholic twice, 76-63 and 90-60, but losing to Tamaqua, 62-59, and Pottsville, 87-70, giving a final tally of eighteen wins to six losses.

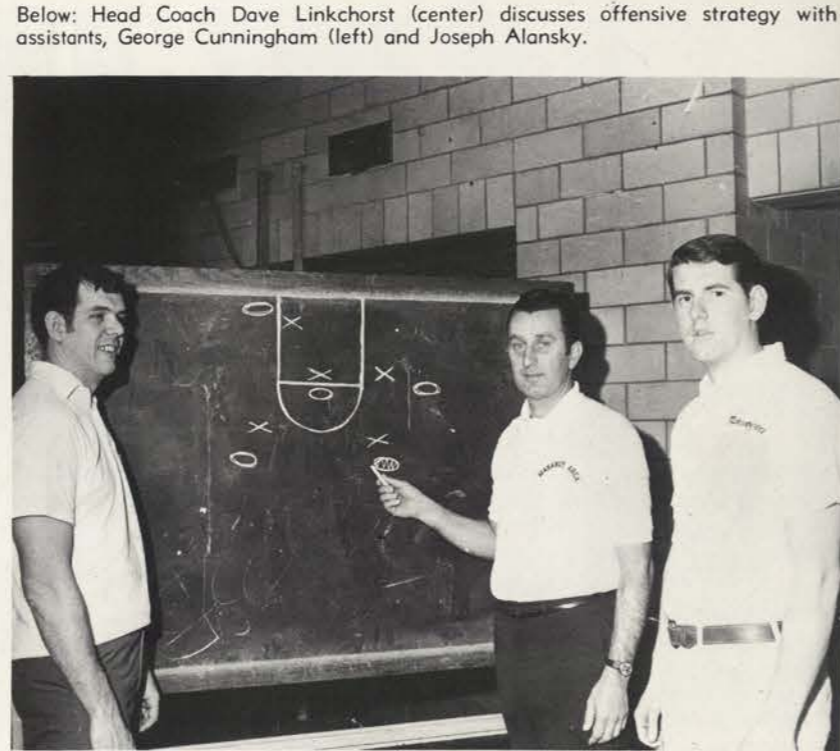

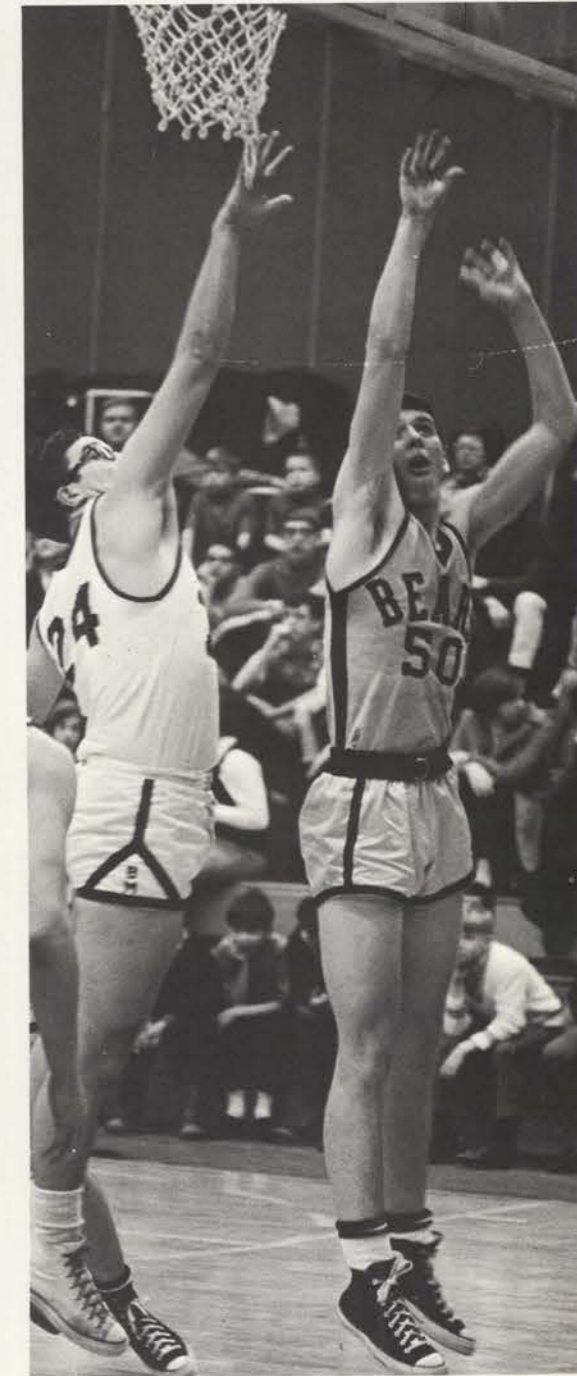

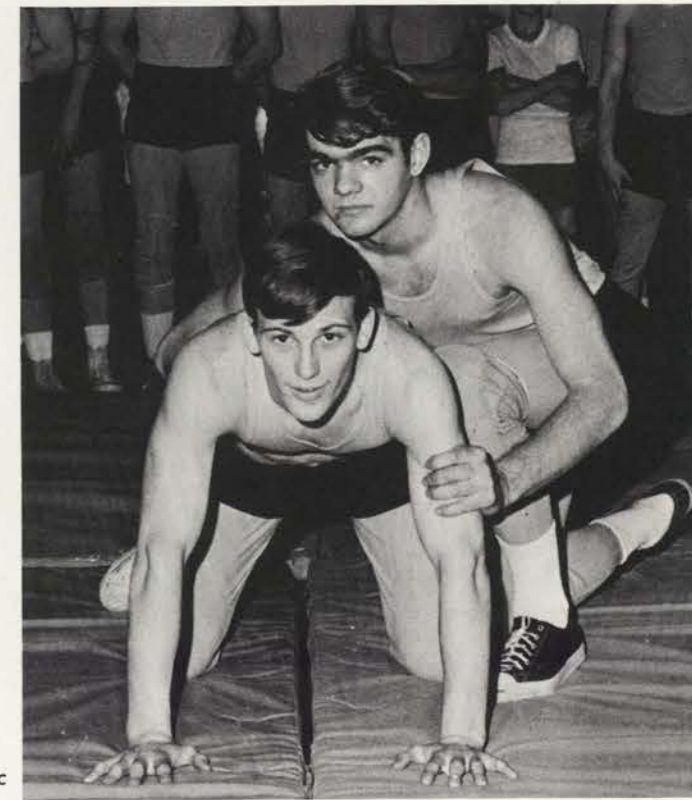

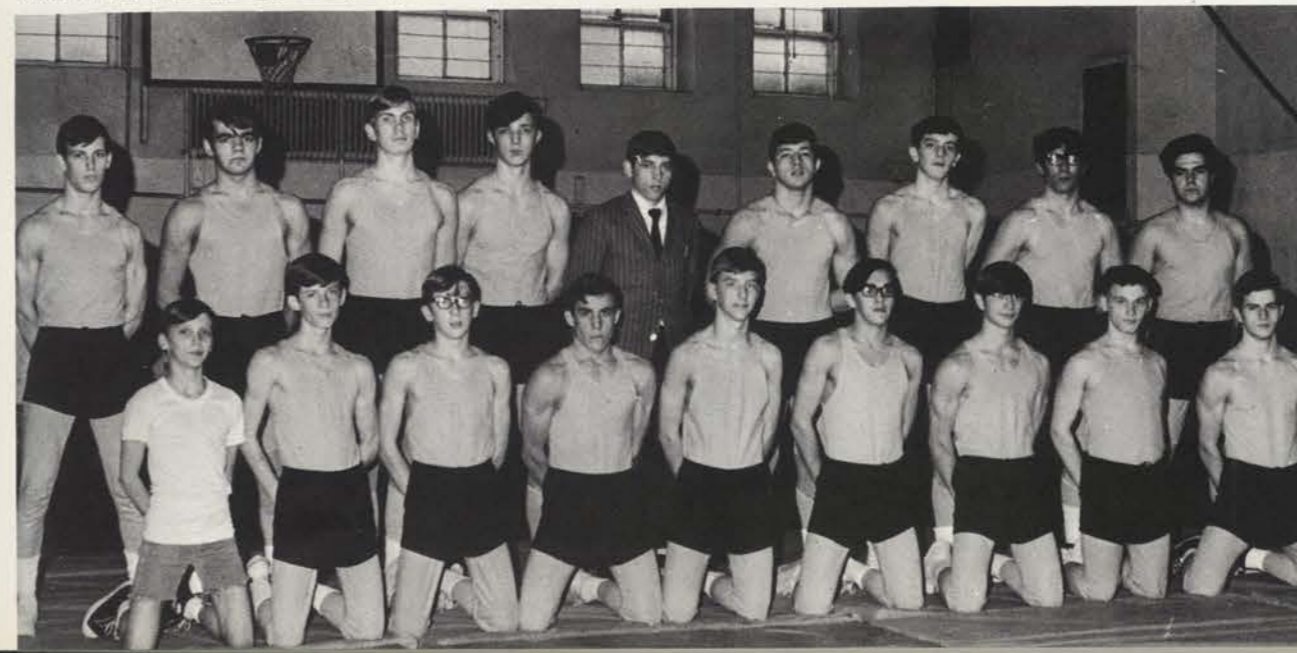

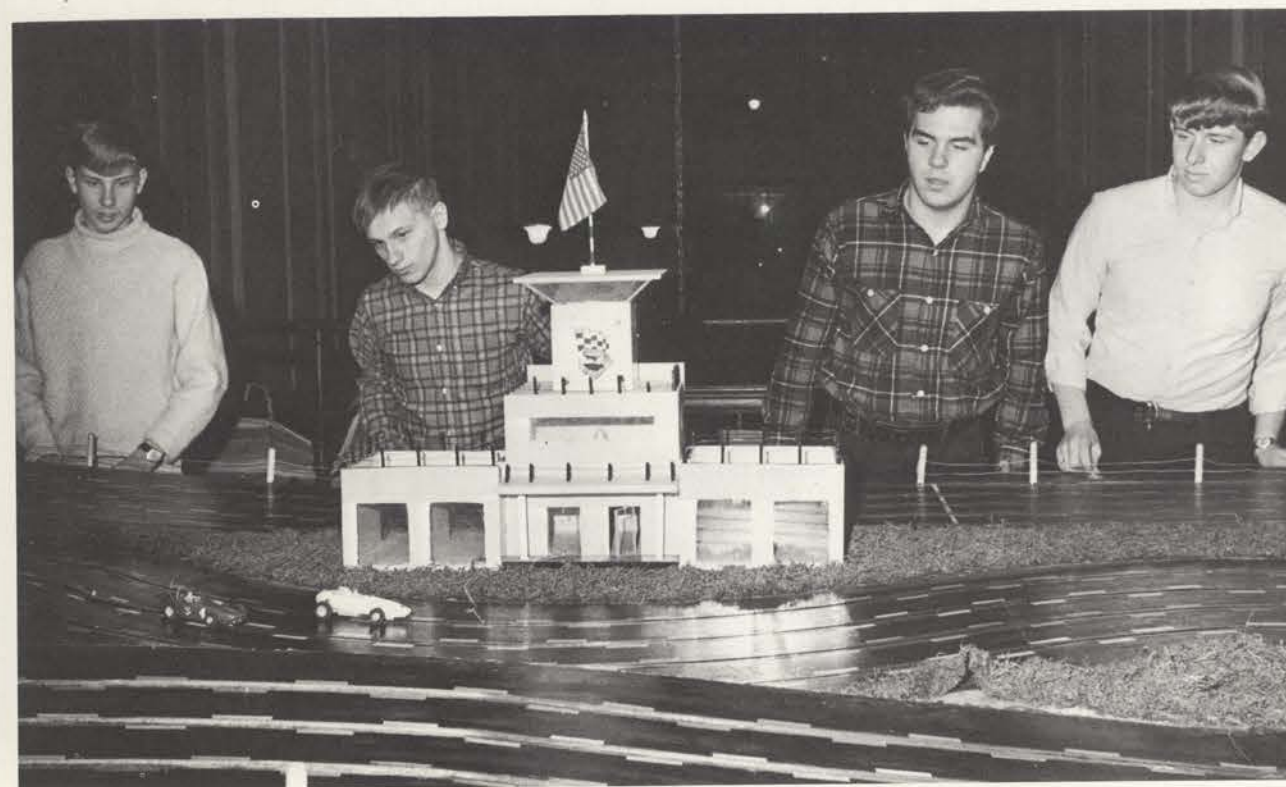

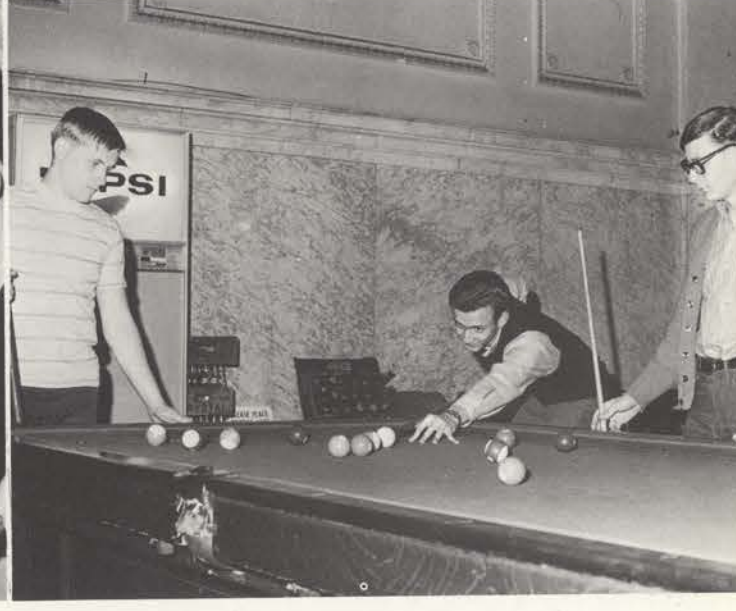
